- Bildad challenges Job on three occasions (8:1–22; 18:1–21; 25:1–6). How do Bildad's words describe his understanding of God and his relationship to people?
- In response, Job speaks to Bildad on three different occasions (9:1–10:22; 19:1–29; 26:1–14). How does Job respond to Bildad? How do Job's words describe his understanding of God?

• How is God still worthy of our trust, even in the midst of our pain?

- Job doesn't deny he is guilty; he only argues that his current situation is not the result of personal sin. Discuss different ways that people can suffer as a result of someone else's choices or other causes. How does Job's story help us to better understand how to empathize with people?

- Imagine that Job's story ended differently. Would it change the way we view its lessons?
